CITY MANAGER:

FAA Supplemental Appropriation Application Submitted:

The application was submitted on October 31, 2018 for the proposed \$563,496 Runway Marking Pavement Maintenance and Rehabilitation Project, which if funded will provide 38,390 LF of crack seal and 545,010 SF of asphalt slurry seal to the runway and apron, 15,199 SF of runway marking, and reconstruct the shoulder with aggregate base rock to prevent erosion.

Meeting with Elementary School Principals and Superintendent:

Planner 1/Recreation Coordinator Molly Marcussen, Police Chief Jeremiah Fears, and I met with local Elementary School Principals and the Superintendent about traffic safety around schools, facility availability for recreation courses, and Treat Street. All Principals felt the issue of safety was caused by students not crossing at crosswalks; they will be pursuing additional signage and issuing citations to students not crossing in crosswalks. They also did not feel in most instances the food carts were causing any safety issues. All of the Principals will be coordinating facility availability for the recreation program. The Principals stated they did not have any students pulled out of school early because of Treat Street; that being said, we discussed approaching the event organizer to ask that the event not start until 3:00 p.m. after the school day ends.

Proposition 47 Desk Review Audit:

The Board of State and Community Corrections is conducting a desk review of our grant documentation. Mary Brimm, Laura Calkins, and I have been meeting with the River Cities' Counseling, The Tehama County Health Services Agency, and the Center for Evaluation and Research to ensure we have all the required documentation. Supporting documentation is due November 15, 2018.

Building Department Software:

Staff is finalizing its analysis of iWorq software for the Building Department and should be able to make a recommendation for purchase once we better understand the process to export existing data from our Track-It software.

Meeting with Paskenta Band of Nomlaki Indians:

Building Official Dan Redding, Councilman Chuy Valerio, and I will be meeting with the Tribe on November 8th to discuss the plan review process.

PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT:

Senior Center:

Work has continued at the senior center and the estimated completion date for the project is November 6, 2018.

Tree Trimming Contract:

The contracted tree trimming work was completed this week.

Drainage Ditches:

The Conservation Camp Crew Members have begun the annual cleaning of the Cities drainage ditches. They will clear brush and debris from the local streambeds of both Jewett and Burch creeks and the Blackburn Moon Drain.

Meetings:

On October 29, 2018 Steve Lindeman attended the Tehama County Winter Preparedness Meeting. This meeting addressed the Tehama County Emergency Operations Center, a 2018 winter outlook presentation and the most likely hazard scenarios that may occur within Tehama County.

POLICE DEPARTMENT:

Patrol:

In addition to responding to 179 calls for service, a total of 20 officer reports were taken and there were 88 officer-initiated incidents, including 53 traffic stops. Officers made 7 misdemeanor and 1 felony arrests. Officers issued 13 citations, of which; 7 were misdemeanors, and 6 were infractions during the period of October 24, 2018 through October 31, 2018.

Training:

Officers continue to participate in POST Portal Training and Lexipol Daily Training Bulletins. Other Officer Field Training and Dispatcher Training is continuing.

Vehicle Abatement:

Due to the continuing light-duty of CSO Robbins, no vehicle abatement has been initiated.

Community:

Last Saturday's DEA-sponsored National Prescription Drug Take-Back Program collected, and turned in to DEA, 229 pounds of unused/unwanted over-the-counter and prescription medications.

Call Volume:

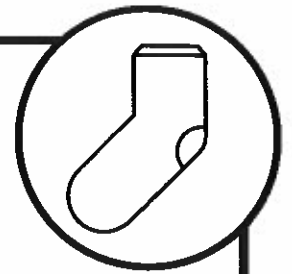
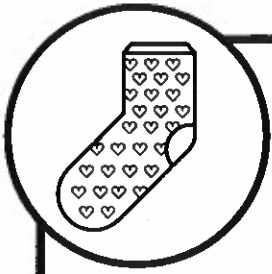
The Corning Volunteer Fire Department responded to 15 calls for service last week. These consisted of 10 medicals, 2 public service, 1 mutual aid fire, 1 mutual aid traffic collision, and 1 investigation.

The Orland Fire Department was dispatched to 18 calls. These consisted of 14 medicals, 3 traffic collisions and 1 investigation.

The Capay Fire Department was dispatched to 2 incidents, one (1) medical and one (1) investigation.
